

## Title: Introduction to Biological Anthropology

### General Course Description:

This course introduces the concepts, methods of inquiry, and scientific explanations for biological evolution and their application to the human species. Issues and topics will include, but are not limited to, genetics, evolutionary theory, human variation and biocultural adaptations, comparative primate anatomy and behavior, and the fossil evidence for human evolution. The scientific method serves as foundation of the course. The course may include a lab component.

**Minimum Units:** 3.0

### Any rationale or comment:

Biological anthropology is one of the core components of anthropology.

### Prerequisite(s):

### Corequisite(s):

### Advisories/Recommendations:

Eligibility for or completion of C-ID ENGL 100: College Composition.

### Course Content:

1. Nature of scientific inquiry and the scientific method
2. Anthropological perspective
3. History and development of biological evolutionary thought
4. Molecular, Mendelian and population genetics
5. Mechanisms of evolution
6. Comparative primate taxonomy, anatomy and behavior
7. The nature of the fossil record including dating techniques
8. Fossil and genetic evidence of human evolution

### Laboratory Activities (if applicable):

The course may include a lab component.

### Course Objectives:

*At the conclusion of this course, the student should be able to:*

1. Describe the scientific process as a methodology for understanding the natural world.
2. Define the scope of anthropology and discuss the role of biological anthropology within the discipline.
3. Identify the main contributors to the development of evolutionary theory.
4. Explain the basic principles of Mendelian, molecular and population genetics.
5. Evaluate how the forces of evolution produce genetic and phenotypic change over time.
6. Demonstrate an understanding of classification, morphology and behavior of living primates.
7. Summarize methods used in interpreting the fossil record, including dating techniques.
8. Recognize the major groups of hominin fossils and describe alternate phylogenies for human evolution.
9. Identify the biological and cultural factors responsible for human variation.

1. In-class discussions and exercises
2. Individual/group writing projects
3. Written or oral quizzes
4. Field assignments
5. Journal reviews
6. Other writing assignments
7. Exams

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## Transfer Model Curriculum Information

In response to Senate Bill 1440 (Padilla, 2010), the Academic Senates for California Community Colleges and California State University decided to develop a faculty-led, state-wide, concerted effort to identify the course content for new **associate degrees for transfer**, which simultaneously award students an associate degree and prepare them for special benefits/guarantees upon transfer to CSU. The C-ID infrastructure is being used to develop and vet the transfer model curriculum (TMC) in each of the most common transfer majors. Further, C-ID is being used to develop “descriptors” for all the courses in the TMCs, providing assurances to students and faculty that courses offered at one institution are comparable to those elsewhere, provided they have the same C-ID number. Once a TMC has been drafted by intersegmental discipline faculty, it is vetted on the C-ID site where feedback is posted by a wider sampling of faculty. Once finalized, TMCs become available for community colleges to use as they develop their associate degree for transfer.

Associate degrees for transfer are either AS-T degrees (for STEM and CTE programs) or AA-T degrees (for all other programs).

##### **COMM 290 Mediated Communication at CSU Los Angeles**

Introduction to mediated communication technologies, including internet, databases, and emerging technologies. Emphasis on critical, analytical assessment of technologies effects on intercultural, public and interpersonal communication

##### **COMM 15 COMPUTER-MEDIATED COMMUNICATION (3) at Reedley College**

From email to social networking to online dating new communication technologies have changed the way people build and maintain relationships. The course explores several areas of study related to computer-mediated communication including historical perspectives, relationship formation online, online dating, hyperpersonal communication, the sociology of social networks and online communities, families and online communication, privacy and safety issues, and the convergence of mass and interpersonal communication.

#### List C - Intro to Journalism

##### **JOUR 1 Introduction to Journalism at Santa Rosa Junior College**

Introduction to journalism, news reporting and writing with an emphasis on journalistic standards, media ethics and the changing nature of the news industry. Students will learn fundamental reporting skills and write news and feature articles for possible publishing in the Oak Leaf college newspaper and/ or website.

#### TMC Summary

*The Communication Transfer Model Curriculum was the result of a process that sought and received input from a strong representation of discipline faculty. A guiding principle for those courses included in the TMC was the likelihood that all California Community Colleges (CCC's) offer at least some of the courses in each category. Enough choices were included so that it is believed that each CCC could offer a transfer degree in the Communication major. After the Communication FDRG created a draft of the TMC, the TMC was posted on the C-ID website for comment. The former IMPAC list-serv was used to reach discipline faculty, and the CIAC, CCC Senate Presidents, and CCC Curriculum Chairs list-servs were used to encourage other faculty to visit the website and review the TMC. In addition, a designated CSU Lead also shared the draft with the Chairs of CSU Departments of Communication and invited input. After a month of comment time, the FDRG reviewed the submitted comments. Some comments that were received during the vetting period suggested a lack of understanding of the implementation of the TMC;*
