A POST-approved arrest and control course covering professional orientation, law, laws of evidence, investigation, community relations, communications (report writing), and arrest and control. Excludes firearms course. Meets POST requirements for the P.C. 832 40-hour course. Required for those peace officers who make arrests.

The successful student will be able to:

1. Identify professional aspects of law enforcement and ethical discretionary decision making.
2. Explain the role of the California court system regarding arrest and firearms.
3. Explain the legal aspects of weaponless defense, control techniques, and restraint of prisoners.
4. Describe and demonstrate the principles used in preliminary investigations.
5. Justify control techniques and restraint of prisoners.

6. Identify and anticipate community relations problems.
7. Demonstrate principles of report writing learned from interviewing techniques.
