REQUIRED WRITING:

A 1-2 page review and critique of each performance participation and involvement.

OUTSIDE ASSIGNMENTS:

Students are expected to spend a minimum of three hours per unit per week in class and on outside assignments, prorated for short term classes.

- I. Attendance at modern dance companies' recitals, films or videos.

- II. Participation in all required performances.
- III. Attendance at all technical rehearsals.
- IV. Individual and small group practice sessions and extra rehearsals when needed.
- V. Costume and prop return; dressing room cleanings.

 - A. choreographic assignments
 - B. choreographic or rehearsal assisting
 - C. organizing and/or performing in supplementary performances
 - D. assembling individual or group props, dance materials
 - E. costume construction or design
 - F. set construction
 - G. preparation of stage, hanging of lights, technical production assistance.

- 50% - Rehearsal, participation and preparation (150 points)
- 35% - Performance participation & quality (100 points)/written critique of performance (5 participation points)
- 15% - Participation in additional production assignments or featured dance work (45 points)
