2. identify, analyze, and evaluate the factors -- geographic, historical, religious, and political -- which influenced the course of French civilization up to the Renaissance.

REQUIRED WRITING:

Students must write one 6-page essay or two 3-page essays on an approved subject or subjects relevant to material covered in the course.

OUTSIDE ASSIGNMENTS:

Students are expected to spend a minimum of three hours per unit per week in class and on outside assignments, prorated for short term classes.

Reading and writing assignments. Students will study textbook and prepare for exams.

INSTRUCTIONAL METHODOLOGY:
