SCOPE OF COURSE:

Continued review of grammatical principles, composition and oral practice.

SPECIFIC COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Successful students will:

1. Demonstrate intermediate communicative proficiency and be able to handle successfully a variety of uncomplicated, basic communicative tasks and social situations, with a quality of pronunciation and intonation easily understood by a native speaker.
2. Possess a good level of vocabulary and functional competence with greater details in areas such as money matters, professions, occupations, health, social and recreational activities, and general feelings.

3. Have a secure knowledge of grammar and sentence structure.
4. Demonstrate an awareness of French cultural norms and values, and of the cultural diversity of Francophone countries.
5. Be able to read and interpret selected passages of Francophone literature and contemporary articles.

SUGGESTED READING:

REQUIRED WRITING:

Three assigned compositions and a final research paper or creative piece of writing in preparation for oral presentation. Total of approximately 10 pages.

OUTSIDE ASSIGNMENTS:

Students are expected to spend a minimum of three hours per unit per week in class and on outside assignments, prorated for short term classes.

A minimum of fifteen hours of study weekly is recommended, including approximately two hours per week in the language laboratory to view the French in Action video program, complete the accompanying workbook oral exercises, and use available CDROM French language study material.

INSTRUCTIONAL METHODOLOGY:

Language teaching through planned immersion by means of a video program which simulates being in France.

Students will see and hear familiar life situations and conversations between native French speakers. They will learn to recognize and imitate verbal and non verbal communication and will be encouraged to practice their language skills through group discussions.

Grammar will be explained and practice exercises assigned to consolidate the acquisition of structures presented in each lesson.

Reading and writing skills will be further developed through the use of literary comments and composition.
