BASIC SKILLS REQUIREMENTS:

Appropriate language skills.

ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS

PREREQUISITE: German 101 or German 106 or two years of high-school German.

COREQUISITE: None

RECOMMENDED PREPARATION: None

SCOPE OF COURSE:

Pronunciation, essentials of grammar, reading, speaking and writing.

SPECIFIC COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Students will acquire basic knowledge of the sounds, vocabulary, and grammatical features of the standard German language. They will develop the ability to identify, analyze critically, and manipulate linguistic and logical features of German and English, including word order, case usage, tense, mood, and voice.

CONTENT IN TERMS OF SPECIFIC BODY OF KNOWLEDGE:

German 110 is a five-unit class which meets five hours per week. An additional hour of language-laboratory work is required. The course covers chapters 5-8 of the text.

- III. Separable and Inseparable Prefix Verbs
- IV. Da-Compounds
- V. Comparison of Adjectives and Adverbs
- VI. Numerals and Time Expressions

- VIII. Simple and Compound Tenses of Modal Auxiliaries
- IX. Relative Pronouns
- X. The Passive Voice

REQUIRED READING:

Vail, Van Horn and Kimberly Sparks. Modern German. 3rd edition. Fort Worth: Harcourt, Brace, Jovanovich, 1986. 188-431.

SUGGESTED READING:

Students are encouraged to go beyond the mandatory assignments and to pursue projects pertinent to the broader historical and cultural dimensions of the study of the German-speaking peoples. A number of selected books and journals are presented and discussed from time to time in class.

REQUIRED WRITING:

Translations into German and English (exercises in text), requiring mastery of grammatical principles, vocabulary, and analytical skills. Total approximately five pages.

OUTSIDE ASSIGNMENTS:

Students are expected to spend a minimum of three hours per unit per week in class and on outside assignments, prorated for short term classes.

Assignments require at least two hours of outside preparation per hour of class lecture. Such preparation includes translation into and from the target language, grammatical analysis, vocabulary learning, and brief cultural reports.

Lecture and class discussion; class sessions are devoted to explanations of grammar, vocabulary drill, pronunciation and conversation practice, translation into and from German, and reading and analysis of German sentences and passages. Students are drilled on these subjects in frequent tests.
