**BASIC SKILLS REQUIREMENTS:**

Appropriate language skills.

**ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS:**

**PREREQUISITE: Latin 201 or four years of high-school Latin.**

**SCOPE OF COURSE:**

Advanced grammatical topics; reading and analysis of major classical and medieval texts; vocabulary building.

**SPECIFIC COURSE OBJECTIVES:**

Students will be able to:

1. thoroughly review first-year work, strengthen their grasp of Latin grammar, expand their vocabulary.
2. study some of the more important aspects of classical and medieval literature, thought, and history.
3. identify, analyze critically, and manipulate those linguistic and logical features of Latin and English--word order, case usage, tense, mood, voice, etc.--which make comprehension and translation difficult.

**REQUIRED READING:**

Wheelock, Frederick M. Latin Literature: A Book of Readings. Prospect Heights, Illinois: Waveland Press. 1993. pp.1-27, 44-62, 72-93, 97-131, 158-183, 205-237.

**SUGGESTED READING:**

Students are encouraged to go beyond the mandatory assignments and to pursue projects pertinent to the broader historical and cultural dimensions of the study of Latin. A number of books and journals are presented and discussed from time to time in class. Total number of pages: approximately five.

**REQUIRED WRITING:**

Translations into Latin and English requiring mastery of grammatical principles, vocabulary, and analytical skills. Total number of pages: approximately five.

**OUTSIDE ASSIGNMENTS:**

Students are expected to spend a minimum of three hours per unit per week in class and on outside assignments, prorated for short term classes.

Assignments require at least two hours of outside preparation per hour of class lecture. Such preparation includes translation into and from the target language, grammatical analysis, vocabulary learning, and brief cultural reports.
