BASIC SKILLS REQUIREMENTS:

Appropriate language skills

ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS:

PREREQUISITE: Music 110

COREQUISITE: None

RECOMMENDED PREPARATION: None

SCOPE OF COURSE:

Continuation of Music 110 and harmonic dictation. Required concert attendance. Required for students with a major in music, but open to all students.

SPECIFIC COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Upon completion of course student will be able to:

1. sing chromatic, modal and whole-tone scales and exercises in solfeggio;
2. sing moderately advanced diatonic, chromatic and modal melodies;
3. perform moderately advanced rhythms involving combinations;
4. demonstrate intermediate melodic dictation; and
5. ability to take intermediate harmonic dictation.

CONTENT IN TERMS OF SPECIFIC BODY OF KNOWLEDGE:

Continuation of all skill activities begun in Music 110, with the addition of harmonic dictation:

- I. Development of pitch memory and pitch recognition within the diatonic set.
 - a. solfeggio (moveable do)
 - b. sung exercises reinforcing diatonic melodic patterns
- II. Development of rhythmic reading

- a. review of principles of rhythmic notation
- b. exercises in clapping or tapping rhythms
- c. assignments on TAP machine, leveled to the ability of the student
- III. Music reading: the culmination of I and II above
 - a. singing and clapping (tapping) simple diatonic melodies and rhythmic phrases
- IV. Pitch identification: the foundation of melodic dictation
 - a. singing known melodies in the "language" of solfeggio
 - b. transfer of solfeggio melodies to music notation
 - c. executing the same process with unknown melodies
- V. Reinforcement and development of student's individual aural skills (interval recognition, rhythm recognition, etc.) via computer programs
- VI. Melodic dictation
 - a. diatonic melodies in simple and compound meters
- VII. Harmonic dictation
 - a. diatonic chord progressions in major and minor

REQUIRED READING:

Class handouts discussing technical skills of sight-reading and dictation.

REQUIRED WRITING:

All writing is done in the musical notational system. The dictation portion of the course content requires writing which is graded in tests, much like essays.

OUTSIDE ASSIGNMENTS:

Students are expected to spend a minimum of three hours per unit per week in class and on outside assignments, prorated for short term classes.

1. practice of skills exercises and assignments in text
2. music reading of all kinds
3. assigned work on TAP and computer

Most exams are individual auditions, combined with dictation given to the entire class. There are 5-7 such exams which make up 90% of the grade. Class participation, such as solo performance of assigned materials, makes up the last 10%. Attendance is a factor in class participation.
