SCOPE OF COURSE:

Review sight-reading and writing in pentatonic scales and progress to major and minor scales, continuing to focus on sight-singing, ear training, keyboard and written scales using relative and absolute solmization.

SPECIFIC COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Successful students will:

1. Demonstrate the ability to sing at sight by means of relative solmization and absolute solmization;
2. Demonstrate ear training and dictation skills;
3. Analyze and perform musical materials with Major and Minor scales as basis;
4. Analyze and sight-read folk songs of many countries;
5. Write in pentatonic, major and minor scales.

CONTENT IN TERMS OF SPECIFIC BODY OF KNOWLEDGE:

- I. Practice in, and understanding of, sight-singing at advanced level.
- II. Guided and sequential approach to ear training and mastering reading and writing major and minor song in solmization.
- III. Special attention toward techniques and vocal pedagogy.
