Public Comments:	Teresa Laughlin commented that she was disheartened by the number of classes that were cancelled prior to the first week of the semester. Several classes in her department that had enrollments totaling 15 or 16 students were cancelled. Of the few with low enrollment that were kept on the schedule, all are now filled with enrollments of over 30 students. The district has indicated that there is a need for efficiency, but more time should have been provided for some classes, and options for broader discussions were not given to all departments. Senators asked that this item be placed on the agenda for the January 26 meeting.

	Senate members reviewed the document on the overhead, and after some discussion agreed that the wording in the policy should be updated to remove any reference to the creation of an Academic Review Panel. Review also highlighted the fact that in this particular student's case, the criteria needed to proceed to a formal grade dispute have not been met. Based on the current policy, the student's complaint can go no further and the instructor's grade stands, as there was no evidence of Title V violation found by the department chair, dean, or Vice President for Instruction.

Hiring Process:	Senators discussed the district's Human Resources application process and the need for an effective, efficient process. Concerns have been raised by some faculty who have participated in the process and have faced difficulties during not only the submission of documents, but during the screening process as well with some documents not being advanced appropriately. Senate President Larson will follow up with HR to ensure that applicants with incomplete applications are being appropriately contacted.
