Workforce and Community Development Advisory Group

Proposal for WCD Instructor Model Senate November 18, 2013

This model is for any full-time or part-time faculty member as well as for any outside person who will teach contract education or fee based classes. The district is not actively seeking or marketing for these classes but will support department and community needs as they arise.

General Information-

- All contract or fee based classes must be approved by the Governing Board prior to the start of the course.
- These courses must be self-sustaining. The use of consumable materials or supplies, the purchase of food or refreshments, or the use of staff paid for by the general fund or Perkins is prohibited.
- 3. If the class is taught at one of the district owned facilities, the WCD class will not conflict with any credit or non-credit courses. All credit and non-credit classes take priority. WCD classes must be scheduled at a time when the district owned facility/classroom is not in use. The facility/classroom selection must be approved prior to the start by the administrator overseeing WCD.

Salaries-

- Current full-time faculty will be paid their current hourly rate from the Overload Salary Schedule.
- Current part-timer faculty will be paid their current hourly rate from the Part-Time Faculty Salary Schedule.
- 3. Due to varying levels of expertise, education, and experience, retired or past part-time faculty members and community members will be paid an hourly rate from the current Part-Time Faculty Salary Schedule to be determined by WDC administration. The hourly rate will not exceed the highest level on the Part-Time Faculty Schedule.
- 4. "Current" hourly rate for all of the salaries above is taken from the appropriate salary schedule and figured at the time the class is taught.

Prep Time Guidelines-

All instructors will receive 25% of the hours for the class as paid prep time at their current hourly rate. For example when teaching an 8 hour class, instructors will earn 2 paid prep time hours.

Materials Fees-

Any materials fees required for the class will be charged to the student or organization. The instructor will determine the cost of the materials for the class. The instructor will turn in written justification of the materials fees on a per student basis to WCD at the time the class is arranged. The materials fee will be advertised as such in addition to the enrollment fees. WCD will collect all materials fees at the time of enrollment. The instructor will turn in all receipt and documentation for use of materials fees to WCD for reimbursement at the conclusion of the class or when materials have been distributed to the students, whichever comes first.

Marketing-

At this point in time, all marketing will be arranged by the instructor. The instructor must obtain prior approval for all marketing and advertising materials (handouts, flyers, brochures, pamphlets...) from the administrator overseeing WCD. The administrator will ensure there is truth in advertising and the information is accurate and in accordance with the college guidelines. Marketing for the class will not take place until all materials are

approved. WCD will support any marketing effort, but will not be responsible for the marketing of the class. WCD will create a Workforce Class Offering website. Any classes offered will be posted on this site by WCD staff.

Evaluations-

Any full-time or part-time faculty who teach contract education or fee based classes will not be evaluated through TERB for those classes. Contract and/or fee based classes are not part of any faculty member's TERB evaluation process.

Motion 3

Fall 2013 Academic Senate Plenary:

Greg Larson provided a report on his recent attendance at the Statewide Academic Senate's Fall Session. He stated that 12 resolutions were brought forward related to Accreditation, although not all were adopted. He noted one resolution where the Statewide Academic Senate called on ACCJC to extend City College of San Francisco's deadline one year. Student Success
Task Force
Recommendations:

Greg Larson reported that he met with Berta Cuaron earlier in the day, and they discussed the possibility of forming an oversight group/task force to address the Student Success Task Force Recommendations. He noted the proposed membership for this task force, and Senators discussed its overlap with the Faculty Advisory Board on Student Success Task Force Recommendations created by the Faculty Senate in May 2012. Discussion followed on the need to once again attempt to fill the vacancies on this committee and move forward rather than create a new group. The proposed membership is as follows:

Accreditation:

Greg Larson reported that various Accreditation writing teams are receiving feedback.

Barb Kelber added that all of the first drafts are in for the Human Resources Standard, and feedback is being received. Results of the recent survey are not in yet. The proposed new standards for Accreditation will not affect us throughout this process as they will not be up for consideration until 2015-16.

Policies & Procedures:

Copies of BP 7211 Faculty Service Areas and Competencies were provided. Greg Larson provided an overview of information included in the policy, stating he felt it might be helpful to include more information about specific types of hires, particularly those who meet only minimum qualifications in the discipline for which they were hired. Faculty members need to be made aware that while they meet the FSA for the discipline for which they are hired to teach, if they qualify for an additional Faculty Service Area (FSA), they need to apply for it. Discussion followed on minimum qualifications and FSAs.

Larson stated that members of Policies & Procedures are also discussing AP 7120, Recruitment & Hiring. Members of the Policies & Procedures task force are still working on language relating to how final hiring decisions are made. There is also work being done on language to codify the process by which departments have traditionally made position requests and by which faculty hiring priorities are determined through procedures in the Instructional Planning Council.

Barb Kelber referred to recent campus-wide correspondence from President Deegan on the district's response to an action taken by the ASG to censure a faculty member. She noted that the recent review of the Students Rights & Grievances Policy is not related to that action. The review is focused on an update of the chart indicating paths for informal resolution of students' complaints, and the current procedure will have to be revised. Kelber added that the review/revision is motivated primarily by the requirements of accreditation standards. Colleges must make student complaint and grievance policies/procedures readily available to students from the college home page. In addition, colleges must track students' complaints.

One Senator also noted that President Deegan seemed to misrepresent the Faculty Senate in the suggestion that the work being done is being done in response to the ASG's action.

Learning Outcomes Council:

Marty Furch provided the following report of the Learning Outcomes Council (LOC):

- Members of the Learning Outcomes Council will meet this week and are expected to approve the GE/ILO Assessment Report from last spring.
- The LOC is assessing GE outcomes for spring 2014

Writing

Quantitative Reasoning

The rubric for Quantitative Reasoning is going forward. The rubric for Writing is being discussed due its focus on essay writing. There are faculty members in some programs who think that particular rubric may not work well to assess the kind of writing required in their courses.

LOC will form a sub-group to look at that rubric again and make recommendations.

Linda Morrow provided the following written report of the Instructional Planning Council:

The Faculty Hiring Subcommittee met on November 13 to review a timeline, process, and rationale form for the 2015-16 hiring.

Palomar Faculty Federation:

Teresa Laughlin reported that members of the eBoard met on Thursday, November 14, and approved the Academic Calendar.

Student Services Planning Council:

Diane Studinka indicated that members of the Student Services Planning Council are reviewing PRPs. All departments under the Student Services Planning Council's umbrella are reporting, so the group heard from the Police department, Department of Student Affairs, and the Transfer Center.

Vice President Gonzalez also presented a report on the Staffing Plan. Over the past several years hiring has been occurring out of order of the positions as they were ranked. Gonzales has assured the group that the procedure of using the current ranking system will be adhered to in the future, or if there are any proposed changes they will first be brought to the Student Services Planning Council.

President Deegan:

Greg Larson stated that he and Jackie Martin attended their bi-monthly meeting with President Deegan last week. Several community college presidents have been solicited by ACCJC to write letters of support for the organization. Palomar College has declined to participate.
