Register for Plenary workshops using our 3PD Portal (which is a part of the statewide Vision ResourceCenter)

- 1. Go to: <u>http://www2.palomar.edu/pages/pd</u> or to our <u>Single Sign On (SSO) page</u>.
 - Log-in using your network username and password (the same one you use for your Palomar email).
 - *i.* Note: If you have problems accessing the 3PD Portal through Single Sign On, please contact the helpdesk at 2140 or email helpdesk@palomar.edu

2. Go to LEARNING and select WORKSHOP CALENDAR

- Note: With so many workshops to choose from, you might find it helpful to switch to the AGENDA view which will put all of the workshops in a list.
- 3. Find the workshops you plan to attend and click on **REQUEST**
 - If you are a **faculty or administrator**, you will automatically be registered after requesting the workshop.
 - If you are a classified, short-term, or student employee, previously you were required to get your manager's approval to attend workshops. Manager approval is no longer conducted through the PD system. Instead, your manager will receive an email notifying them of your registration and asking them to respond. If there is an issue with your registration your manager will communicate directly with you. We hope this will make it easier for our staff to register and attend PD workshops.

Faculty Professional Development (Flex) Requirement/Eligibility

Faculty, please review Article 10 of the PFF contract for contractual information about PD requirement/eligibility.

Full-Time Faculty Professional Development Requirement

Full-Time Faculty are required to complete 42 hours/year and must have all hours officially completed in the 3PD Portal by 2 weeks before the end of the spring semester. All hours completed after the annual due date are included in the follow years total hours.

Part-Time Faculty Professional Development Eligibility

Part-Time Faculty are eligible to be compensated extra pay for officially completing PD hours by the due date. The amount of hours each part-time faculty member is eligible to be compensated for is based on their workload.

PD Eligibility Calculation: Workload x 21 = eligible bours

• To calculate eligible hours for PT Faculty multiply the percentage workload by 21 hours (21 hours represents what a FT Faculty would receive on 100% load per semester).

- Example for a PT Faculty member with 60% load: $.6 \times 21 = 12.6$ hours
- Part-Time Faculty can see their workload and eligible hours on their welcome screen in the 3PD Portal.
 - NOTE: If the workload does not look correct, PT Faculty need to contact their Academic Department Assistant to make sure it is correct in PeopleSoft. The workload in the 3PD Portal is pulled directly from our system of record, PeopleSoft (the PD Office cannot adjust workload in the 3PD Portal, it must be corrected in PeopleSoft).

Due Dates for Part-Time Faculty PD:

- In the Fall semester PD hours must be officially recorded and completed in the 3PD Portal between August 1st and December 1st.
- In the **Spring** semester PD hours must be officially recorded and completed in the 3PD Portal between January 1st and May 1st.
- NOTE: Completed hours are not accepted after the due date, it is very important to check your Completed Hours Dashboard to ensure all of your hours are reported and counted.

How do you know when your PD hours have been officially completed and counted in your total?

- Check your Completed Hours Dashboard! Your Completed Hours Dashboard will show you exactly what is reported to payroll.
- How to access your Completed Hours Dashboard:
 - Log in to the 3PD Portal
 - Click on REPORTS
 - Select DASHBOARD
 - REFRESH the graph
- If you are missing hours on your Completed Hours Dashboard, please check these 2 things:
 - 1.) **REFRESH your Completed Hours graph**. The graph does not automatically refresh.
 - 2.) Make sure you don't have any training that is still Active on your Transcript as "Pending Evaluation" or "Pending Signature". If you have training that is still in a pending status they won't be included on your Completed Hours Dashboard.

- Step 1: Go to our Palomar Single Sign On to access your Zoom account (it is very important to be logged in to your Zoom account before attending a Zoom workshop/meeting. This ensures you get credit for attending).

- Step 3: Select the Zoom tile from our SSO
- Step 4: To access the meeting you have two options, 1.) copy and paste the Zoom URL into your browser, or 2.) click on "Join a Meeting" and enter in the Zoom Meeting ID.





Faculty Professional Development (Flex) Requirement/Eligibility

Faculty, please review Article 10 of the PFF contract for contractual information about PD requirement/eligibility.

Full-Time Faculty Professional Development Requirement

Full-Time Faculty are required to complete 42 hours/year and must have all hours officially completed in the 3PD Portal by 2 weeks before the end of the spring semester. All hours completed after the annual due date are included in the follow years total hours.

Part-Time Faculty Professional Development Eligibility

Part-Time Faculty are eligible to be compensated extra pay for officially completing PD hours by the due date. The amount of hours each part-time faculty member is eligible to be compensated for is based on their workload.

PD Eligibility Calculation: Workload x 21 = eligible hours

- To calculate eligible hours for PT Faculty multiply the percentage workload by 21 hours (21 hours represents what a FT Faculty would receive on 100% load per semester).
- Example for a PT Faculty member with 60% load: .6 x 21 = 12.6 hours
- Part-Time Faculty can see their workload and eligible hours on their welcome screen in the 3PD Portal.
 - NOTE: If the workload does not look correct, PT Faculty need to contact their Academic Department Assistant to make sure it is correct in PeopleSoft. The workload in the 3PD Portal is pulled directly from our system of record, PeopleSoft (the PD Office cannot adjust workload in the 3PD Portal, it must be corrected in PeopleSoft).

Due Dates for Part-Time Faculty PD:

- In the Fall semester PD hours must be officially recorded and completed in the 3PD Portal between August 1st and December 1st.
- In the **Spring** semester PD hours must be officially recorded and completed in the 3PD Portal between January 1st and May 1st.
- NOTE: Completed hours are not accepted after the due date, it is very important to check your Completed Hours Dashboard to ensure all of your hours are reported and counted.

How do you know when your PD hours have been officially completed and counted in your total?

- Check your Completed Hours Dashboard! Your Completed Hours Dashboard will show you exactly what is reported to payroll.
- How to access your Completed Hours Dashboard:
 - Log in to the 3PD Portal
 - Click on REPORTS
 - Select DASHBOARD
 - **REFRESH** the graph
- If you are missing hours on your Completed Hours Dashboard, please check these 2 things:
 - 1.) REFRESH your Completed Hours graph. The graph does not automatically refresh.
 - 2.) Make sure you don't have any trainings that is still Active on your Transcript as "Pending Evaluation" or "Pending Signature". If you have training that is still in a pending status they won't be included on your Completed Hours Dashboard.





Professional Development (or Flex) Requirement/Eligibility

Faculty, please review Article 10 of the PFF contract for contractual information about PD requirement/eligibility.

Full-Time Faculty Professional Development Requirement

Full-Time Faculty are required to complete 42 hours/year and must have all hours officially completed in the 3PD Portal by 2 weeks before the end of the spring semester.

Part-Time Faculty Professional Development Eligibility

Part-Time Faculty are eligible to be compensated extra pay for officially completing PD hours by the due date. The amount of hours each part-time faculty member is eligible to be compensated for is based on their workload. To calculate eligible hours for PT Faculty multiply the percentage workload by 21 hours (21 hours represents what a FT Faculty would receive on 100% load per semester).

PD Eligibility Calculation: Workload x 21 = eligible hours

Example for a PT Faculty member with 60% load: $.6 \times 21 = 12.6$ hours

Part-Time Faculty can see their workload and eligible hours on their welcome screen in the 3PD Portal. If the workload does not look correct PT Faculty need to contact their Academic Department Assistant to make sure it is correct in PeopleSoft. The workload in the 3PD Portal is pulled directly from our system of record, PeopleSoft (the PD Office cannot adjust workload in the 3PD Portal, it must be correct in PeopleSoft).

Due Dates for Part-Time PD:

- In the Fall semester PD hours must be officially completed in the 3PD Portal between August 1st and December 1st.
- In the **Spring** semester PD hours must be officially completed in the 3PD Portal between January 1st and May 1st.
- NOTE: Completed hours are not accepted after the due date!

How do you know when your PD hours have been officially completed and counted in your total?

- Check your Completed Hours Dashboard! Your Completed Hours Dashboard will show you exactly what is reported to payroll. If you are missing hours on your Completed Hours Dashboard, please check these 2 things:
 - 1.) REFRESH your Completed Hours graph. The graph does not automatically refresh.
 - 2.) Make sure you don't have any trainings that are "Pending Evaluation" or "Pending Signature". If you have trainings that are in a pending status they won't be included on your Completed Hours Dashboard.

Our 3PD Portal = The Vision Resource Center



In the Fall 2017 we launched our 3PD Portal which is powered by a professional learning management system called Cornerstone On Demand. In the Fall 2018, we began transforming our 3PD Portal into what is now known as the statewide Vision Resource Center. We led the way for Professional Development transformation across the state helping many colleges move from paper triplicate forms for PD to this same online system we are using. Now our 3PD Portal is just one of the many portals within the VRC that are specifically for other colleges. At this time almost 40 colleges have joined us!


How does being a part of the Vision Resource Center benefit us?






