VII. DISCUSSION

A. T.O.P Code Alignment Project – Takeaways

The full list of recommended changes was evaluated. There was good discussion. Most of the recommended changes were made. A few areas had questions and concerns and their suggestions were

- kept. Some looked at courses which were not on the list and made adjustments. The entire project needs to be finalized by the end of the month. The process worked well and is a good model for future large projects. Part of the struggle is that some have been taught to think of vocational and transfer as different. It doesn't matter if a course is a transfer course. If the course teaches skills that may be used in a career, it is vocational. The institution as a whole needs to be educated in this regard. Perhaps a workshop for these and other curriculum issues needs to be held. California is the only state that uses TOP Codes and they are a funding mechanism. Vocational and transfer courses are not "different". CSUs and UCs don't use TOP Codes and never see TOP Codes. Course Outlines will need to be updated moving forward.
- B. New Program Approval Process**
This draft is an attempt to fine-tune the process and is still being developed. Currently an originator is able to input and launch a program without any discussion. Discussion of the form took place with suggestions to add necessary codes (T.O.P., etc.). There were questions regarding vocational and transfer as well as courses in non-transfer programs. Phase two of the form was discussed with questions of what needs to be clarified and how the discussion will take place (face-to-face meeting or other methods). This process could tie into program review. Clarification of regional overlap was discussed including college and name of the program. There was a question as to whether this form needs to address general education and transfer. All agreed with the general premise of this process. The form will continue to be developed.
- C. Proposed Changes to Title 5 related to Distance Education**
The Chancellor's Office proposal was discussed. There is an opportunity for the public to offer comments. The Chancellor's Office and ACCJC are looking at Distance Education (DE). The intent is to more clearly define the way colleges review and evaluate DE courses/classes. The directive for instructor contact continues to be clarified. Regular effective contact is being replaced with substantive contact between instructor and student (specifically called regular and substantive interaction). The goal is to align with the federal education code. Our regional SDICCA (San Diego & Imperial Counties Community Colleges Association) doesn't agree with this total alignment and has submitted their comments. Our current checklist needs to be revised as there is no way to substantiate the responses on the DE pages. Any changes made need to be reflected in our Board Policy. An addendum to the official COR addressing how outcomes will be achieved and how substantive interaction is met needs to be added. Accessibility needs to be addressed as well. Faculty may ask that their courses be reviewed by Academic Technology but they are not forced. Support for DE students is being addressed but now accessibility needs to be addressed as it could impact civil rights. We need to start DE conversations for new courses and update our checklist. Discussion about validation of courses and classes and who should perform this needs to be addressed. Should the curriculum committee be the one to oversee this? Some departments require POET but not all do. Other colleges require a certification (40 hours) where an instructional designer evaluates and addresses contact requirements. In addition to POET, Palomar is nearing completion of a DE pilot. The process to meet the law is extremely demanding. Mandatory training may be required in order to meet ADA standards although the Faculty Senate is resisting. POET includes a robust accessibility section which is being constantly upgraded to address requirements. The demands of DE courses can be more than those of face-to-face. It is the law that we meet these requirements. Accessibility lawsuits are happening. Accessibility of videos, textbooks and all course materials needs to be addressed. Southwestern College has hired an accessibility specialist who corresponds with publishers to meet these requirements. Publishers' materials are not meeting requirements. Should curriculum oversee this (COR with addendum and connection of outcomes)? The number of courses offered online and in Canvas was discussed.
- D. Cross-listed Courses**
Next year, we will look at all cross-listed courses and evaluate whether they should continue to be cross-listed. There may be some courses which may be able to have their cross-listing removed. The real issue with these courses is minimum qualifications. Though Palomar's process has improved, it still needs work.
- E. Redesigning America's Community Colleges** – This was not discussed.
