President Deegan: Greg Larson indicated that he and Jackie Martin attended their scheduled meeting with President Deegan last week. Discussion focused on the succession plan. Larson also noted that President Deegan has stated that all Academic Department Assistant positions will be replaced.

Shannon Lienhart reported that the Negotiations Advisory Council will meet on Wednesday, February 11. A draft of the proposed compressed academic calendar has been distributed to faculty members. Other similar variations of the calendar are also being discussed before a final version is approved.

Lienhart expressed frustration with the lack of progress in negotiations with the district, stating that it is expected that a consultant will be hired to negotiate for the district after Vice President Tortarolo's retirement. There is also concern with funds being moved out of the General Fund and into areas such as Fund 41, Capital Outlay Fund with no discussion.

Full-Time Faculty Hiring Process:

Senators were provided with a draft copy of the Faculty Hiring Procedures. Lengthy discussion occurred on the proposed changes in the document, and some additional amendments were recommended in the sections referring to diversity, providing hard copy applications, selection committee screening, and the role of the observer.

Kelber also shared copies of a proposal from the joint IPC/SSPC Workgroup on Hiring/Replacing Counselors and Librarians.

This item will remain on the agenda for further discussion on February 23.

Rationale Form for Full-Time Faculty Positions:

Copies of the Rationale Form for Full-time Faculty Positions – 2016-17, was distributed for discussion. Senators briefly discussed the document and Pam McDonough and Jackie Martin noted some of the minor changes being proposed. This item will be brought forward for Senate Action on February 23.

Compressed Calendar Proposal:

Senate members were provided with copies of the proposed Palomar College 2016-17 academic calendar. There was overall support among Senators for the compressed calendar, though Greg Larson noted that members of the Mathematics department had some objections due to the number of high-unit classes offered in that department, and the difficulties such classes present for scheduling. Changes are still being made to

address some of those concerns, which will affect departments that regularly teach classes of more than 3 units.

After brief discussion, Senate members expressed their support for the proposed compressed academic calendar.
