INSTRUCTIONAL SERVICES

BP 4020 PROGRAM, CURRICULUM, AND COURSE DEVELOPMENT

References:

Education Code Sections 70902(b) and 78016;
Title 5 Sections 51022, 55100, 55130, and 55150

The programs and curricula of the District shall be of high quality, relevant to community and student needs, and evaluated regularly to ensure quality and currency. To that end, the Governing Board, relying primarily on the Faculty Senate, through the Curriculum Committee, shall establish procedures for the development and review of all curricular offerings, including their establishment, modification, or discontinuance.

Furthermore, these procedures shall include:

- regular review and justification of programs and course descriptions;
- opportunities for training for persons involved in aspects of curriculum development.

All new courses, ~~and~~ programs, and course, and program deletions shall be approved by the Board.

All career/technical training programs and courses shall be reviewed every two years by the Board.

All new programs shall be submitted to the State Chancellor's Office for approval as required.

Individual degree-applicable credit courses offered as part of a permitted educational program shall be approved by the Governing Board. Non-degree-applicable credit and degree-applicable courses that are not part of an existing approved program must satisfy the conditions authorized by Title 5 regulations and shall be approved by the Governing Board.

Directive for Vocational Program Review: California Education Code

**EDUCATION CODE
SECTION 78015-78016.5**

78015. (a) (1) The governing board of a community college district, prior to establishing a vocational or occupational training program, shall conduct a job market study of the labor market area, as those terms are defined in Section 52301.5, in which it proposes to establish the program. The study shall use the State-Local Cooperative Labor Market Information Program established in Section 10533 of the Unemployment Insurance Code, or if this program is not available in the labor market area, other available sources of labor market information. The study shall include a California Occupational Information System supply analysis of existing vocational and occupational education or training programs for adults maintained by high schools, community colleges, and private postsecondary schools in the area to ensure that the anticipated employment demand for students in the proposed programs justifies the establishment of the proposed courses of instruction.

(2) The governing board of the community college district shall make copies of each job market study available to the public.

(b) Subsequent to completing the study required by this section and prior to establishing the program, the governing board of the community college districts shall determine whether or not the study justifies the proposed vocational education program.

(c) If the governing board of the community college districts determines that the job market study justifies the initiation of the proposed program, it shall determine, by resolution, whether the program shall be offered through the district's own facilities or through a contract with an approved private postsecondary school pursuant to Section 8092.

78016. (a) Every vocational or occupational training program offered by a community college district shall be reviewed every two years by the governing board of the district to ensure that each program, as demonstrated by the California Occupational Information System, including the State-Local Cooperative Labor Market Information Program established in Section 10533 of the Unemployment Insurance Code, or if this program is not available in the labor market area, other available sources of labor market information, does all of the following:

- (1) Meets a documented labor market demand.
- (2) Does not represent unnecessary duplication of other manpower training programs in the area.
- (3) Is of demonstrated effectiveness as measured by the employment and completion success of its students.

- (b) Any program that does not meet the requirements of subdivision (a) and the standards promulgated by the governing board shall be terminated within one year.
- (c) The review process required by this section shall include the review and comments by the local Private Industry Council established pursuant to Division 8 (commencing with Section 15000) of the Unemployment Insurance Code, which review and comments shall occur prior to any decision by the appropriate governing body.
- (d) This section shall apply to each program commenced subsequent to July 28, 1983.
- (e) A written summary of the findings of each review shall be made available to the public.

Learning Outcomes Council:

Marty Furch provided copies of an updated version of the Student Learning Outcomes and Assessment Cycle Plan 2009-14, as well as copies of Program Review SLO questions, approved by the Learning Outcomes Council on Thursday, September 10. These documents will be considered by the Curriculum Committee at its next meeting, and Senators were asked to review the updated documents for additional discussion and/or approval at the September 21st Senate meeting.

Motion 5

MSC Gowen, Towfiq: To suspend the agenda to discuss Information items B and C, the grant proposal for the Clean Energy Workforce Training Program, and the BSI/HSI Report. The motion carried.

BSI/HSI Report: Gary Sosa, Faculty Co-Coordinator of the Basic Skills Committee and Title V/HIS Steering Committee, provided an update on the First Year Experience Program and the

ongoing attempts to develop activities geared toward new students. Sosa reported that the inaugural “Palomar Premiere” event was successful, attended by over a hundred new students as well as many faculty and staff members. He noted that next year’s event will likely be even more successful, and he acknowledged the work of Counseling faculty member Tere Egkan Hogan, organizer of the event.

Sosa also described ongoing efforts to develop and/or expand learning communities, the advising and referral process, orientation and support services, and a summer bridge program.

Sosa reminded Senators of the grand opening of the Teaching/Learning Center (TLC), scheduled for Wednesday, September 16, from 4:00 – 7:00 p.m. at the Escondido Center. The TLC will initially offer tutoring in English and Math, and services will soon expand to include tutoring intended specifically for ESL students. More information will be distributed in the upcoming weeks, and the Basic Skills Committee hopes that participation will increase as faculty members become more aware of the Center and its potential to serve our students.

Clean Energy
Workforce Training
Program:

Senators had previously discussed the proposal for a Clean Energy Workforce Training Program Grant at the August 31st Senate meeting. The proposal, submitted through Workforce and Community Development, was facilitated by the Grossmont-Cuyamaca Community College District. It proposes collaboration between the Grossmont-Cuyamaca CCD, the California Center for Sustainable Energy, the Ease County One Stop Career Center, and Palomar College.

An overview of the rationale for Palomar’s participation was outlined in the grant proposal, which asserts that California is experiencing unprecedented growth in the green building industry as well as a corresponding increase in the demand for skilled workers. Additionally, the influx of funding through the Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant (EECGB) Program for local cities and the passage of legislation such as Assembly Bill (AB) 1470 and AB811 will further increase this demand. To meet the needs for additional skilled workers, California must focus on retraining its workforce in the areas of clean, affordable energy. Unemployed or underemployed workers with previous construction experience are an ideal target for this effort. This target population can quickly build upon their existing skills with green training provided by community colleges that will prepare them for jobs in the green building industry.

Consequently, Employment Development Department (EDD), the California Energy Commission (CEC) and the California Workforce Investment Board, in conjunction with the Labor and Workforce Development Agency (LWDA) will soon award clean energy workforce development training grants to address the need for skilled workers in industries related to energy and water efficiency and renewable energy. San Diego community colleges are poised to help meet this need.

In addition to the District’s dedication to training a green workforce, they are host to the following California Community College Chancellor’s Office Economic and Workforce

Development Initiatives: Environmental Training Center, the Center of Excellence and the Workplace Learning Resource Center – each uniquely poised to assist with the charge of greening the local workforce.

Dean Wilma Owens provided additional information and responded to Senators' questions.

On another matter relating to learning communities, Owens stated that if faculty members participate in learning communities that include a career/technical component, those classes can be included in the Perkins Plan and paid for by the Perkins Grant. The Perkins Plan stipulates that the linked classes must combine the career/technical course with an academic partner-course, such as Reading, Math, English, etc. Proposals for learning communities or linked courses must be submitted to the State by April for the fiscal year beginning July 2010. Interested faculty should contact Dean Owens for additional information.
