1. F-1 Student visa forms and requirements

Before you can start classes at Palomar College, you will need:

- **Valid passport from your country of residence**
- **SEVIS I-20 issued by Palomar College**

If you are currently attending another school in the United States, you will need a Palomar SEVIS I-20 prior to starting classes. Check with your current school to ensure your SEVIS I-20 form has successfully transferred to Palomar. Palomar's SEVIS School Code is SND214F00077000.

- **F-1 visa status**

Upon arriving to the United States, international students will need to show their passport with a valid F-1 visa stamp, along with your printed-out SEVIS I-20- form at the port of entry. COPIES OF YOUR I-20 FROM YOUR PHONE OR DEVICE WILL NOT SUFFICE. Students applying for change of status to F-1 will need proof of change of status application or approval.

F-1 visa students at Palomar College agree to maintain F-1 visa requirements:

- Register and attend a minimum of 12 academic units each semester
- At least 9 units of the 12 must meet in-person (weekly in-class meetings) each semester
- Cannot work without permission from the International Office

2. Report to Palomar College International Education Office

When you arrive to California you need to report to the International Education Office located at 1140 West Mission Road, San Marcos, CA 92069. Bring your:

- Passport
- SEVIS I-20 form(s)
- Official high school/university transcripts (for future use)
- Address where you are staying
- Medical and vaccination records (for future use)

3. International Student Orientation

You must attend International Student Orientation before classes begin. Check the [Newly Accepted Student website](#) for dates and locations. Failure to participate in all the orientation sessions may result in the cancellation of your classes. Please plan your arrival at Palomar College to attend Orientation.

4. Money

You should bring enough money to last you at least one semester (4 months). Do not carry a large amount of cash. It is strongly suggested that you bring a credit card, in addition to cash. Be aware that it can take a week or more to open a bank account, and wire transfers can take 1-2 weeks.

Tuition fees are due at the time of registration. You must pay all the fees on the same day as you complete your registration, or you may be dropped from classes.

- Palomar College accepts credit cards (Visa, MasterCard, and American Express). You can pay by cash, traveler's check in person.
- We also offer a payment plan to divide fees throughout the semester. You can create a payment plan in your MyPalomar account. All fees must be paid before students can register for future semesters.

The following is an estimate of costs for one semester at Palomar College. Fees are subject to change.

	Academic Expenses per semester (can pay be credit card)
\$5,100 minimum	Tuition and fees for 12 units (\$415 per unit). You must take a minimum of 12 units each semester. Most of our students take 12-16 units pers semester.
\$500	Textbooks (approximately)
\$15	Student ID/Activity Card (optional but provides bus pass discount)
	Additional Expenses per semester (some credit card, some cash or equivalent)
\$892.50	Mandatory accident/sickness Insurance (12 months=\$2142)
\$46	Parking Permit (if you drive to school)
\$57.60	Monthly bus/train pass when purchased with Palomar Student Activity card.
\$6,000 - \$6,500	Homestay fees for one semester (16 weeks)
\$12,740 - \$15,000	Estimated expenses per semester (Personal expenses are not included)

5. Housing around San Marcos

Homestay

Palomar College does not have any on-campus housing. **You must secure a place to live prior to your arrival.** Homestay programs provide short-term and long-term housing options for international students. You may contact any of the following private homestay service organizations. **Please note:** *Palomar College holds no responsibility for the posted ads other than a service to the students who desire housing or shared housing.*

Renting an apartment

Renting an apartment in North San Diego County can be very expensive. Some of the sites we usually refer our students include: www.apartmentguide.com and www.apartments.com. The zip code for Palomar College is 92069. Be aware that apartments require additional responsibilities for furniture, connecting utilities, and Wi-Fi.

Once you get settled at Palomar and become familiar with the area, you may become interested in sharing an apartment or house with roommates. If you would like to rent a room, you may research availability check online for postings or asking other students.

6. Getting Around in the Community

Airport arrivals

Distance from Palomar College to airports:

- San Diego airport to Palomar College is 40 miles
- Los Angeles airport to Palomar College is 100 miles

Transportation options from San Diego Airport:

- [San Diego Flyer](#) is a free shuttle bus from the airport to Old Town Transit Center. At the Old Town Transit Center, you can take the [Coaster commuter train](#) to Oceanside (daytime only). From Oceanside, the [Sprinter train](#) to San Marcos.
- [Prime Time Shuttle](#): Offers shared shuttles, private shuttles, black cars, and SUVs
- [SuperShuttle](#): Offers black cars and SUVs
- [GO Airport Shuttle](#): Offers upfront pricing
- Ride Sharing apps such as Uber or Lyft

Public Transportation around Palomar College

[North County Bus & Train Service](#) is the local public transportation system. Many students take the bus (Breeze) and/or the train (Sprinter) to come to school. Students who purchase a Palomar Student ID/Activity card can receive a discounted transit pass.

Driving

Some students plan to have a car to drive to school. California requires a valid, current driver's license and insurance to drive a car. We can assist international students qualify for a [California driver's license](#) when you report to Palomar College.

7. Employment Opportunities are limited

Employment opportunities for F-1 visa holders are very limited, so make sure that you have enough money for the entire period of your stay. *Do not depend on an on-campus job to pay for your tuition or housing.* It will not be enough. Information on job options and requirements will be discussed during Palomar College's International Student Orientation

8. Things to Do Before Arriving at Palomar College

- **Purchase Accident/Sickness Insurance**

International students studying at Palomar College are required to purchase the international student sickness/accident insurance policy, even if you have your own insurance policy. No other policy will be accepted. Students must show proof of insurance every semester.

- **Medical/Dental/Vision Check-ups**

You are strongly recommended to have medical, dental, and vision exams before you come to the U.S. The accident/sickness insurance policy does not cover your dental or vision needs, and these services in the U.S. are very expensive. If you have any cavities, make sure that you complete your dental work before you leave home.

- **Register for classes**

Class enrollment begins 3-4 months before the start of the semester. You will follow the steps to create your student account and select classes.

- Complete the math and English/ESL(English as a Second Language) self-assessment. Your placement will be displayed in your [MyPalomar](#) student portal under "[Test Scores](#)" from the "Academics" drop down menu on the left, red column of your Dashboard.
 - Students receive math placement based on the Palomar College application and a self-assessment survey in the [MyPalomar](#) student portal after initially signing in.
 - For English/ESL, students will read [writing examples](#) and [email us](#) letting us know which example (Writing A to D) best matches their current writing skill level. We can then assign English/ESL placement.
- [Review the Palomar College Orientation Presentation](#). We recommend taking notes and write down any questions you may have to ask a counselor.
- Review the current catalog and the general education requirements based on your program goal. You will go over some of these resources together with an academic counselor.

- Schedule an academic counseling appointment via Zoom. You can request an appointment by emailing us at internationalstudents@palomar.edu and we will let you know the dates/times available (Pacific Standard Time). Once you are scheduled, you will receive a Zoom link for your session sent to your Palomar email. The counselor will develop an educational plan for you, recommending classes based on your program and major.
- [Follow the steps](#) to purchase the [school health insurance policy](#). The International Education Office will receive notification once purchased and will remove the hold to allow you to enroll in classes.
- Enroll in your classes through your [MyPalomar](#) student portal. View the [how to select classes](#) tutorial.
 - REMINDER: SELECT 9 UNITS IN PERSON AT THE MAIN CAMPUS IN SAN MARCOS.
 - Use the [Plan Your Schedule Sheet](#) to avoid classes that overlap or are offered at other campuses.


