Important questions to ask when Planning your College Education






How American Colleges may differ from those in your home country


- You select, register, and drop yourself from classes

What will my teachers expect of me?


- Be an active learner

How to find instructor's email address?




From Palomar's home page, click the search icon. Enter the instructor's last name (make sure you select the 'directory' button. Click search and you see the instructor's email address





- Attend all sessions of each class.
- Make up missed coursework.
- Instructor may drop you for excessive absences.





Pass/No Pass?

P Passing (At least satisfactory - A, B, C grades. Units awarded not counted in GPA)

NP No Pass (Less than satisfactory, or failing - D or F grades. Units not counted in GPA.)

!! NP becomes illegal when received for lack of attendance!!

When should I see a Palomar College counselor?


- At least once per semester

COLLEGE TERMINOLOGY





PREREQUISITE

A requirement that must be satisfied *before* enrolling in a particular course; usually a prior course or placement test score

MATH 110 COLLEGE ALGEBRA (4.0 units)

Prerequisite: A minimum grade of 'C' in MATH 56 or MATH 60, or eligibility determined through the math placement process

CO-REQUISITE

A course required to be taken at the same time as another course

HE 100 HEALTH ED/FITNESS DYNAMICS (3.0 units)

Corequisite: HE 100L (see class notes for LAB section)


Class Schedule

College catalog

- A paperback book printed each year
- Contains important course and major information
- Outlines all current college policies
- Shows all regulations and requirements that apply to you during the year you begin your program of study

- Find out about AA degree majors, certificate of achievement and certificate of proficiency requirements.



Course Numbering System

Courses numbered 100 or higher Degree applicable AA/Transfer to CSU/UC

Check Catalog. Certain restrictions may apply for transferring courses

Courses numbered 50-99 AA Degree applicable

Courses numbered 1-49 Non-Degree applicable



Course Description

Psychology 100

A general introduction to the principles of human and animal behavior. Topics covered include history of psychology, research thinking, intelligence, lifespan development, gender and human sexuality, motivation and emotion, health psychology, personality and other related topics.

CSU;UC

Crashing a Class

Crashing a Closed Class

If a class is closed (all spaces in the class are filled) and wait list is not available, you will have to "crash" the class. In order to crash a closed class, you must attend the first class meeting. If the class is online, please email the instructor. Let the instructor know you are not enrolled and wish to "crash" the class. If there are no-shows (enrolled students who don't claim their seats), you may have an opportunity to be added to the instructor's student specific permission list to add the class. There are no guarantees on whether or not a student will be successful in crashing a class. Once added to the instructor's student specific permission list, you will need to log into your MyPalomar and add the class prior to the add deadline.
