The ICE regulations appeared to have eased with international students and the enrollment is stabilizing and beginning to move up. Increased marketing efforts in targeting countries have improved the numbers of students.

We will assess the success of the system by comparing the number of students leaving the college without completing their education program (we will not count the number of students not completing their programs due to the family emergencies back home).

Students accepted with TOEFL score of 450-470 with proper ESL placement will maintain a minimum GPA of 2.7.We will measure this outcome by tracking the students' TOEFL score at the time of admission, ESL placement, counseling appointment (once a semester or more) and early alert system with the ESL faculty (instructor will notify out office when a student is failing the class).

Student's completion of the program is difficult to assess due to unforeseen events students may face (illness, loss of financial sponsor, emergency back home, unsuccessful visa renewal, etc.)
