PART 2: PROGRAM REFLECTION

1. Program Analysis:

Reflect upon and provide an analysis of your summary data.

Spring data analysis through spring 2017: Spring 2016 Enroll at Census was 42. Rose to 113 for spring 2017. Fill rate decreased from 65% spring 16 to 62% spring 17. WSCH increased from 163.40 to 324.20 respectively. FTES increased from 5.45 to 10.31 respectively.

Success remained consistent at about 73% from fall 15 to fall 16 Retention remained high at from 91.1% to 89.7% respectively.

There were 4 AA awards in 2015 and 3 in 2016. There were 6 Certificates in 2015 and 5 in 2016.

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	I haven't heard anything from the group of faculty working on the pathway to law school initiative. There is a finalized AAT in Law and Public Policy, which I've attached. Right now, I am not aware of any CSU campuses accepting the degree as similar, but I am sure that will change as time goes on. I've also attached the ASSIST articulation for UCSD Law and Society. The degree is housed within Sociology with a heavy emphasis from the sociology discipline. I am not finding any of the program requirements for Legal Studies within the lower division major preparation for Law and Society. Additional clarification to the statement on the right margin referencing "legal studies students may major or minor in "Law and Society" upon transfer to the UCSD is needed. I have located an interdisciplinary law and society program at UCSD, but this is a "minor" not a BA. The minor requires seven courses, of which five must be upper-division. We do not have articulation for lower division into this minor. Secondly, students wishing to double major at UCSD are under the terms of UCSD. As a result, I would recommend removing the reference to double majors. Finally, I am working with UCSD extension to renew the existing agreement to continue accepting LS 105, 121, and 145. I'll keep you updated as soon as it's finalized. Something to keep in mind, is that students must have a BA or significant legal experience to be admitted into the Paralegal program on a full-time accelerated basis. Students with an AA will be admitted part time only.
