
#### APPLICATION TO ENROLLMENT (PRELIMINARY) PALOMAR COLLEGE



#### PALOMAR COLLEGE - STUDENT PROGRESS


- About 50% of NEW applications to Palomar resulted in an enrollment at Palomar. <u>Preliminary</u>
   <u>Data.</u> Follow-up Needed
- First Fall to Second Fall represents the biggest drop in first-time student persistence with almost 50% of first-time students not returning for their second fall. Recall that our students express an interest in completing a certificate/degree/transfer. **Retention is key moving forward**.
- Course success rates remain steady over time within <u>course type</u> and <u>semester</u> but vary by type.
   (note we do observe differences in course success rates when disaggregating across demographic variables) IR&P can provide follow-up report when we share progress on equity.
- While increasing, the completion of transfer math and English in their first year (using the SCFF definition) remains a challenge for our students. A comprehensive evaluation of the impact of AB705 is underway.

#### PALOMAR COLLEGE - DEGREES AND CERTIFICATES\*



#### PALOMAR COLLEGE – STUDENT COMPLETION SUMMARY

- Increases in Associate Degrees comes by way of increases in Associates Degrees for Transfer
- Median time to completion of a degree is about four years.
- Mean number of units per degree is over 90 units.\* NOTE the CO has updated their methodology to utilize units earned with a "D" grade. An area for follow-up by the College. Guided Pathways.
- While volume of associate degrees awarded are increasing, we are experiencing a downward trend in volume of transfers.
- When we disaggregate the data, we find differences across demographic variables. IR&P can provide a follow up report when we report on equity.

#### Student Journey Entering Cohort Tool

- Volume metrics alone do not tell the student journey or story
- Persistence
- Progress (Unit Completion / Course Success Rates / Completion Math and English in first year)
- Completion (Degree, Certificate, Transfer)
- Tool will allow the user to select student cohorts (demographic, first-time, full-/part-time)
- Vision for Success and Equity Progress (when released by the Chancellor's office)
