

## AB 705 Throughput Brief - 2021

This research brief examines throughput for English and math beginning with the Fall 2015 cohort. The students included in this analysis are the fall, first-time cohorts from each academic year. *Throughput* is defined as volume and percent of first-time students who complete transfer-level math and English in one year. Tables 1 and 2 show one-year throughput figures for English and math respectively, and Table 3 displays the one-year throughput for completion of both transfer-level English and math. Each of these tables are broken down by race and ethnicity.

Overall, English throughput increased from about 22% for the Fall 2015 cohort to about 40% for the Fall 2019 cohort, which is the first cohort to enter the college under full implementation of AB 705. Not only did the overall throughput rate increase by about 18 percentage points, but it increased for each of the subpopulations examined. For example, English throughput for Hispanic students was at 19.5% for the Fall 2015 cohort, which means one-out-of-five Hispanic students in the first-time cohort completed transfer-level English by the end of their first year. This rose to 38.7% for the Fall 2019 cohort – an increase of about 19 percentage points, showing a slight closure of the gap for Hispanic students.

Math throughput also increased from about 12% to about 19%, and all subpopulations increased their throughput rates. It is important to note that this math throughput measure, to be consistent with AB 705, requires completion of transfer-level math, not just degree-applicable math.

While throughput has increased substantially in both English and math, and gains have been made by all subpopulations, these tables reveal that gaps still exist for black and Hispanic students. For the Fall 2015 cohort black students had an English throughput rate of 15.3%, which is about seven percentage points below the overall rate of 22.7% for that cohort. For the 2019 cohort black students had a throughput rate of 28.0%, which is about 12 percentage points below the overall rate. Similarly, black students increased their math throughput rates from 5.8% to 7.9%, but still lost ground relative to other students. As noted above, Hispanic students increased their English throughput rate, and narrowed that gap slightly. However, their increase in the math throughput rate of 6.4 percentage points

did not quite keep pace with the overall increase of about 7 percentage points. Both black and Hispanic students had lower English and math throughput rates relative to other students, and while these subpopulations saw increases in their throughput rates post implementation of AB 705, the throughput gaps they have been experiencing were not meaningfully narrowed.
