

AB 705 Experience: Student Registration Survey

October, 2020

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Introduction

This study was designed to gain a better understanding of the student experience for those entering Palomar College under the implementation of AB 705, which went into effect in the fall term of 2019. The study gave focus to how well students understood their placement, and for those who had not enrolled in English or math, why they had not. This study is part of a larger research project on the implementation of AB 705. This report includes a description of the data, the results, and a brief summary. Appendix A includes the text of the survey questions. Appendices B and C contain student suggestions for improving the placement process.

Data


The data come from an online survey conducted during the registration period for the fall 2020 term at Palomar College. The survey was in the field from August 10 to September 8, after the fall census date. After students registered for classes, an email request with a link to the online survey was sent to first-time students, followed by a reminder a week later. Respondents were randomly assigned to complete either the English or math section of the survey. A total of 592 students completed the anonymous survey, with 301 responding to the English section and 291 responding to the math section.

Results

Course Taking

Table G1 summarizes previous course taking for the survey participants, and Figure G1 shows the number of classes in which these students were enrolled.



English

English Placements

Figure E1 shows that three out of five respondents indicated they received an English placement. Those that said they received a placement were asked how easy the placement was to understand. Figure E2 shows that over a third (35.6%) of the respondents found the placement very or extremely easy to understand, and another third (32.2%) found it moderately easy to understand. Table E1 shows that two thirds (67.4%) of the respondents reported that they knew what English course to take.





Suggestions for Making the English Placement Process Easier

All student suggestions to make the English placement process easier are found in Appendix B. The suggestions were most likely to be focused on (a) getting more detailed information, (b) getting greater clarity, and (c) having information pushed out to them through email.

"When I chose English 100 it was confusing to me why I couldn't pick the teacher I wanted without taking English 49. I ended up finding a class that didn't require English 49, but I was very confused at first."

"I asked my counselor what she recommended and she was helpful at first but when I tried adding the class it said I needed a support class with it. So I contacted my counselor and she was like yes you need to add it but then I later figured out I could switch the time and teacher and it didn't make me add a support class. I ended up without a support class but she made it unclear to me whether I needed it at first."

"Have the high school counselors tells us about it so we know a little more:"

"Emailing it to you and explaining why"

"Process is pretty simple and easy to understand."

"Have councilors contact new students"

"If it's not too much of a hassle, maybe communicate with me through email please :]"

"explain what the numbers mean next to the class and what english class has the support class with it that would be great thanks: 1"

Enrollment in English

Students were asked if they had enrolled in English in the summer or fall terms. Table E2 shows that most respondents had enrolled in English, but those who hadn't were asked why they hadn't. As indicated in Table E3, a third (33.3%) of the students indicated that they were more interested in other classes, and a quarter (25.8%) said they were not sure what class to take. Other reasons are listed in Table E5.



Students who enrolled in English were asked if they followed the recommendation they had received when they applied. Three quarters (74.8%) of these students reported that they followed the recommendation, as illustrated in Figure E3. Those who reported they had not were asked why they hadn't followed the recommendation. Tables E5 and E6 summarize their responses. Uncertainty about which class to take was the most common reason offered.

Plans for Enrollment in English

Students who hadn't enrolled in English in the summer or fall were asked if they planned to enroll in English in the spring semester at Palomar. Figure E4 shows that half (50.0%) of these students do plan to take English in the spring term. For those not planning to take English in the spring, their reasons are displayed in Tables E7 and E8. Figure E5 shows the proportion of students who plan to take English that intend to follow their placement recommendation.






Math

Math Placements

Figure M1 shows that half (50.2%) of the respondents indicated they received an Math placement. Those that said they received a placement were asked how easy the placement was to understand. Figure M2 shows that three in ten (29.9%) of the respondents found the placement very or extremely easy to understand, and two thirds (66.7%) found it moderately easy to understand or easier. Table M1 shows that just over half (54.1%) of the respondents reported that they knew what English course to take.





Suggestions for Making the Math Placement Process Easier

All of the student suggestions for making the placement process easier are found in Appendix C. Consistent with those for English, these suggestions related most commonly to (a) getting more information, (b) greater clarity, and (c) receiving the information by email.

"have a meeting with a counselor to see what class we should take & understand why"

"set up counseling, or take a math placement test"

"very hard time finding the correct classes to choose from and then selecting it, hard time even knowing which classes applied to me until i spoke with a counselor"

"Perhaps having a one on one with us and explaining which math class would be the best for us to take."

"In the future you could try making it easier to understand what math classes we need to take in the future. Because I was put into Group K and it was hard to find information about what math classes go with that group."

"Maybe describe what each class is about and/or why we were selected for that math class."

"If there were an email or notification with more information on how to find your math class, how to register and a overview of what to expect"

"Maybe if we could have a automatic email emailed to us to tell us what specific class we need to take and what the different math levels are and what they mean for our future"

"Make it known that there is a quiz or something we should take to find out. Or have our high school tell us which math we should take or just give a detailed explanation of each math class and let us decide."

"It only told me I was in math group L, but it would help a lot more if it was more specific. What course names are in "math group L" or what kind of math classes I'd need for this, etc."

"Explaining what math courses there are and why you recommend the one you do."

Enrollment in Math

Table M2 shows that most respondents had enrolled in math, but those who had not enrolled in math were asked why they hadn't. As indicated in Table M3, about a quarter (27.8%) of the students indicated that they did not want to take math online, and similar numbers reported that they were more interested in other classes (25.9%), or were not sure what class to take (25.0%). Other reasons are listed in Table M4.

Students who enrolled in Math were asked if they followed the recommendation they had received when they applied. A little under two thirds (63.7%) of these students reported that they followed the recommendation, as illustrated in Figure M3. Those who reported they had not followed the recommendation were asked why they hadn't. Tables M5 and M6 summarize their responses. Table M6 shows that those who responded "other" tended to believe their recommendation was inappropriate or inaccurate.



Plans for Enrollment in Math

Students who hadn't enrolled in math in the summer or fall were asked if they planned to enroll in math in the spring semester at Palomar. Figure M4 shows that nearly half (45.4%) of these students do plan to take math in the spring term. For those not planning to take math in the spring, their reasons are enumerated in Tables M7 and M8. Figure M5 shows the proportion of students who plan to take math that intend to follow their placement recommendation.




Summary

During the registration period for the Fall 2020 semester new students registering at Palomar College were asked to complete an online questionnaire focused on (a) the ease of understanding the placement process and (b) the reasons they did not enroll in English and math courses. The results reveal that placement recommendations were not clearly understood by a significant proportion of Palomar students.

Interest in other classes and uncertainty about which course to take were the most common reasons offered for not enrolling in English and math. For math, students also expressed a desire to avoid taking math classes online.

Students had a number of suggestions for improving the placement process. Prominent among them were (a) getting more information, (b) greater clarity, and (c) receiving the information by email.

I am not sure, I talked to a counselor that helped me pick my classes.

I am not sure. After I registered, the English class I needed to take was on my student center and I confirmed that class with my counselor.

I asked my counselor what she recommended and she was helpful at first but when I tried adding the class it said I needed a support class with it. So I contacted my counselor and she was like yes you need to add it but then I later figured out I could switch the time and teacher and it didn't make me add a support class. I ended up without a support class but she made it unclear to me whether I needed it at first.

I believe the way you're doing it now helps a lot!

I don't know because a meeting with a counselor is ideal but there's nothing you can do because of COVID-19.

I don't think you should change anything. The whole process was very easy to understand.

i had no help when applying and i wanted to take english and math but i did not qualify to take them i suppose since i hadnt gotten any information back about it.

I have AP credits to transfer and I was a little confused on what advantage that gives me in terms of class placement.

I have AP credits to transfer so I wasn't sure how to apply that.

I have no way of saying.

I never received an email as to what English class to take or any general ED class to take so I think working on getting that information out to students would help greatly

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I only was confused because I passed out of the English class I was placed in due to an AP test so I had to reach out to change my English course.

I personally had no bad experiences with knowing what English class to take.

I saw the English class on my Student Center. I never thought of asking whether it was right, or if I should take a test. I assumed it was recommended correctly based on my high school transcript. Maybe a note or email along the way "why we recommend English 100 for you"? I never had a real 1:1 counseling session to discuss (Palomar too busy last summer). Once I called with a question about how to get a summer class, and a counselor said "I'm just going to put a placeholder EdPLan for you". It wasn't a genuine counseling session. I wasn't sure what that was, but got an email with a set of classes that I didn't want or some I didn't need. It had a Psych class on it that I didn't need (got a 5 on AP exam Psych). It was hard to know how to correct it. I signed up for a Quik Question -- thank goodness [Name Redacted] took all the extra time to help me figure out how to change the draft EdPLan. So I never had a real 1:1, just an extended "Quik Question" session. Thank God for [Name Redacted].

I talked with ESL councelor on zoom

I think if we had been told in highschool prior to applying it would have been helpful.

I think it was very simple and easy.

I think what you have been doing has been easy and good to find out what English class to take.

I think you could make the process easier by listing the name of the English class instead of saying English 101 it would say English composition so the student knows exactly what she's taking

I took AP Lit and didn't have my scores yet, so I was not sure which English class to take yet until I received my scores. This is not on Palomar but rather part of taking AP classes.
