Where Are They Now?


HORACE & FRAN DIXON, Florence, OR

Fran was blessed and felt privileged to be the primary




caregiver for her Mom, Shirley O'Rourke, also a PACRA member, prior to the Lord taking her home on December 14, 2008.

Palomar College NEWS BRIEFS

Bonnie Dowd, Palomar College's Vice President for Finance, resigned her post in September to become Executive Vice Chancellor for Business Services at the San Diego Community College District. Dowd said she'll continue to take a personal interest in Palomar College and will represent it and other campuses as the president-elect of the Association of Chief Business Officials for California Community Colleges.

2 On June 30, 2011 the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges reaffirmed Palomar's accreditation, commending the college for changes that President Robert Deegan said will also improve services to students. The College specifically improved its methods of measuring student progress, ensured the quality of online or distance learning, updated some personnel policies, and, most important, aligned its goals with its budget. "We're a stronger, better institution for the work that we've done," he said.

Palomar College bans smoking on campus. In July 2011 the Board of Trustees decided to scrap the College's former policy that allowed smoking in some areas of the campus as long as it occurred at least 20 feet from any buildings. Now, smokers will have to stay off campus completely if their cigarettes are lit.

Performing Arts program plans for temporary quarters during theater remodel. A two-year theater renovation will be an exercise in improvisation for performing arts students and faculty, as classes and performances are dispersed throughout the campus during construction. The \$16.8 million upgrade will remodel the 27,250 square-foot theater and add 12,081 square feet of new classroom and studio space.



PACRA Hosts Annual Meeting

The Twentieth Annual Meeting of PACRA was held on May 19, 2011, at *The Old Spaghetti Factory* in San Marcos. PACRA President Ken Burns welcomed the approximate 40 attendees and introduced first-time attendees to the meeting.

President/Superintendent Bob Deegan gave an update on the status of Palomar College, noting that nineteen new faculty have been hired and eighteen faculty members retired as of this year. He gave an update on the campus building program which is underway utilizing Prop M bond monies. President Deegan also assured all attendees that current retiree health care benefits remain secure, are not subject to change, and he reiterated the Governing Board's policy commitment to continue to fully fund the cost of these benefits.

Steve Spear, recently retired Palomar College Earth Science professor, gave a presentation on earthquakes, explaining the different types of fault lines and seismic waves, and how best to prepare for an earthquake event. The presentation was educational, entertaining and engaged the entire audience.
