## Spelling of Comparative and Superlative Forms

Rule	<u>Simple</u>	<b>Comparative</b>	<b>Superlative</b>
For short adjectives and adverbs, add	small	smaller	smallest
"-er or –est"	short	shorter	shortest
	narrow	narrower	narowest
For adjectives that end in "e",	nice	nicer	nicest
add "-r or –st"	late	later	latest
	simple	simpler	simplest
For two-syllable adjectives that end in	pretty	prettier	prettiest
"y", change the "y" to an "I" and	heavy	heavier	heaviest
add"-er or –est"	crazy	crazier	craziest
For one-syllable adjectives that end in	thin	thinner	thinnest
consonant-vowel-consonant, double the f	sad	sadder	saddest
consonant and add "-er or -est"	hot	hotter	hottest
